Teen Dating Violence Information for Teachers

What is it?

Teen dating violence is abusive, controlling, and forceful behavior in a dating relationship. It demonstrates the abuser's need to dominate and control the victim. Violent behavior can include verbal, emotional, sexual, or physical abuse.

Verbal and emotional abuse includes:

• Name calling, threats, screaming, criticizing, and ridiculing

Sexual abuse includes:

• Unwanted sexual touching and kissing, intimidating the victim to participate in any form of sexual activity, and rape

Physical abuse includes:

• Pushing, punching, slapping, kicking, choking, and any other actions that cause physical

Why do we care?

Students who are victims of dating violence are likely to:

- perform poorly in school.
- isolate themselves from their friends and classmates.
- show sudden changes in their mood or personality.
- display a lack of interest in school or other extracurricular activities.

Students who are <u>perpetrators</u> of dating violence are likely to:

- have been exposed to in-home violence as a child.
- exhibit anger management problems.
- have a history of fighting or aggressive behavior.

What can we do about it?

- Learn how to recognize the mental and physical warning signs associated with dating violence.
- Incorporate lesson plans that address dating violence. Teach students how to recognize the signs that tell them whether they are at risk of entering an abusive relationship or are already involved in one.
- If a student is either a victim or perpetrator in a violent dating relationship, encourage him/her to seek help from professional that specializes in relationship violence or a community-based organization that offers assistance to those involved in abusive relationships.
